Memorandum of Strategic Cooperation Agreement signed to take WSCM to... Beijing in 2026!

On 8 September 2024, a significant meeting occurred in Lisbon, Portugal, at the Palacete dos Condes de Monte Real, headquarters of IFCM. IFCM President Emily Kuo Vong met with Li Jinsheng, Chairman of China Arts and Entertainment Group (CAEG), to discuss an exciting possibility for the next World Symposium on Choral Music (WSCM) in 2026. Mutually committed to the goal of promoting international cultural exchange through the development of choral music, IFCM and CAEG agreed to expand their time-honoured partnership based on the principles of "resource sharing, complementary advantages, brand interaction, and mutual development." IFCM and CAEG signed a Memorandum of Strategic Cooperation Agreement which aims to present the 14th WSCM in Beijing, China, in 2026 in collaboration with the 18th China International Chorus Festival (CICF).

Online webinar: "Creating Choral Music: Talking about the Requirements of Choral Repertoire"

Saturday, 23 November 2024, online, 8pm CET

The Webinar "Creating Choral Music: Talking about the Requirements of Choral Repertoire" will focus on the art of choral composition. Three well-known composers will share their ideas on how to create choral music for ensembles today, using their own compositions as illustrations. To develop this theme, IFCM invited composers from different regions of the world:

<u>Marie Herrington</u> (USA). Marie is a Ukrainian-American soprano, composer, and conductor.
 The winner of the IFCM Composition Competition 2023-2024, she will present her winning



piece A Jelly-Fish along with two other choral works.

- Jaakko Mäntyjärvi (Finland). Jaakko is a professional freelance translator and composer
 as well as an amateur/semi-professional choral singer and conductor. He is one of Finland's
 internationally, best-known composers of choral music with a catalog of 150 works published
 to date.
- Eva Ugalde (Basque Country, Spain). With an intimate relationship with the choral world, Eva began writing music for raw voices, encouraged by Javier Busto, one of the pioneers of the new wave of composers that flourished at the end of the 20th century. She is regularly invited as jury member in international composition competitions around the world.

Conductors Without Borders becomes Conductors Beyond Borders

At its summer board meeting, IFCM Board of Directors approved a new name for its international conducting project: **Conductors Beyond Borders (CBB)**. In view of the program's many initiatives that facilitate connections between conductors from different geographical regions and/or between conductors and singers from neighboring countries, the new title is more appropriate and descriptive.

In 2025, certain CBB sessions will be linked with the European Choral Association's Peer-to-Peer Exchange Program. As a result, these CBB sessions will receive some financial support from the **Choral TIES project** which is coordinated by **European Choral Association**, cofunded by the **European Union Creative Europe programme**, and organised in cooperation with **IFCM**. A call for choirs interested in this program will be launched soon. Stay tuned!

World Youth Choir Summer Session: An unforgettable journey!

Joining forces with the National Youth Orchestra of Germany – <u>Bundesjugendorchester</u> (BJO), the <u>World Youth Choir</u> (WYC) performed 11 breathtaking concerts across three different countries (Germany, the Netherlands, Italy) under the masterful direction of **Tan Dun** (USA) and **Jörn Hinnerk Andresen** (Austria) in August and September 2024.

The concert featured Ludwig van Beethoven's masterpiece *Symphony No.* 9 and *Choral Concerto: Nine* by Tan Dun, who conducted the Bundesjugendorchester and the World Youth Choir for this performance at the Bonn Opera House. *Choral Concerto: Nine* was commissioned for the WYC-BJO session as a complementary choral/orchestra work to be paired with Beethoven's *Symphony No.* 9. Plan ahead and program this new, exciting 'choral concerto'



during 2027 which marks the 200th anniversary of Beethoven's death.

Tribute: Nobuaki Tanaka (1 January 1928 – 12 September 2024)

Nobuaki Tanaka, longtime leader within the Japanese choral world, Conductor Laureate of the Tokyo Philharmonic Chorus, and a Person of Cultural Merit, has died at the age of 96.



Born in Niigata Prefecture, Japan, Nobuaki Tanaka was a junior high school music teacher prior to entering the vocal music department of Tokyo University of the Arts. After graduating university in 1956, he founded the Tokyo Philharmonic Chorus with his fellows sharing the same values, becoming its permanent conductor and developing the ensemble into one of Japan's preeminent professional choral groups. Nobuaki Tanaka devoted himself to the creation of Japanese choral works, commissioning various composers and premiering 460 choral works. He served as choral conductor for numerous performances by the Berlin Philharmonic, NHK Symphony Orchestra, and others. At the same time, he was actively involved in teaching amateur choirs and was selected as a Person of Cultural Merit in 2016 in recognition of his achievements. An active conductor through his life, his last stage performance was at the "Tokyo Philharmonic Chorus Special Concert - with Nobuaki Tanaka - Tokon All Stars" held on 31 August 2024 at the Tokyo Metropolitan Theatre.



Maestro Tanaka had a special connection with IFCM through the World Youth Choir (WYC). He was the conductor of the 1997 WYC summer session in Japan, the 1999-2000 WYC winter session in Belgium, and the 2009 WYC 20th anniversary concert in Sweden. Maestro Tanaka had the ability to truly engage the singers in their interpretation of demanding Japanese repertoire. The choir's performance of Hikaru Hayashi's "Mizu o Kudasai" (Give Me Water)



in Hiroshima is remembered by those present (singers and audience alike) as a moment of unforgettable emotional impact. The choir had visited the Hiroshima Peace Memorial Museum where the singers witnessed the horror of the atomic bomb. However, it was Maestro Tanaka who unearthered deep understandings of text and music within the singers with his words: "Create your own music and, at the same time, create it together as a group."

Federació Catalana d'Entitats Corals: Catalunya Prizes for Choral Compositions 2025
The 10th International Prizes "Catalunya" for Choral Composition of the <u>Federació</u>
<u>Catalana d'Entitats Corals</u> (FCEC) is open until 31 January 2025. Composers can enter compositions based on Catalan texts and harmonizations of traditional Catalan songs in two categories: mixed voices and equal voices.

The Orfeó Català is also holding a choral composition competition with the same deadline. The winners will be announced in July 2025. The winning pieces will be published by the FCEC and distributed to members of choirs and to others by request. These works will also be performed at the Choral Music Fest on 1 March 2026 at the Palau de la Música Catalana. Register here.
